From the Vicarage

THIS summer we are going to lona as a family for a week and staying at the Bishop's House, a short walk from the Abbey. Our last stay on the island was when Helen was pregnant with Mark, and John was a toddler. It rained every single day. I remember John running round and round the cloisters in a red anorak and blue wellington boots.

My most formative memories of Iona were half a lifetime ago when I was living on the island for three months as a volunteer with the Iona Community. My role was as 'Abbey Guide' in a line of guides said to go back to the late great George MacLeod.

My principal duties were to show people around the abbey grounds and to give people an overview of the Christian history of the island since Columba. It also involved setting up for services, sweeping, dusting, polishing and replenishing candles. Over 200,000 people visit the island each year, and most visitors at the Abbey want to light a candle before they leave.

Being the guide was good honest



work. I got nourishing food, basic accommodation and £20 a week. Apart from the moments I was caught out in horizontal rain, living on the island was delightful and I was quite content. I met plenty of interesting people, not least my fellow volunteers, who came from all over the world.

People say that Iona is a 'thin' place and I would concur: it feels as though there is a gossamer-thin thread between heaven and earth. I enjoyed a simplicity of life-style, a strong sense of connection with those around me, with creation and with God. I was conscious more than at any time hitherto of the presence of the Holy Spirit in my life.

I write this in Ascensiontide as Pentecost fast approaches. In this season of Pentecost may we each discern the direction the Holy Spirit gives our lives as we seek to live lives that are more and more Jesus shaped.

Tap and Go A new and effective way of giving......

Many people no longer carry cash. Instead they now increasingly use credit and debit cards. The use of cash has been steadily declining. By 2020 it is expected that nationally, twice the volume of payments will be made by contactless cards compared to cash.

This situation also applies to collections in church where those not familiar with our services, eg those attending baptisms, weddings or funerals, are often embarrassed at not being able to contribute to the collection simply because they don't carry cash. For this reason many churches are now introducing card readers so that payment can be made using plastic as an alternative. At St Giles, during Christian Aid week, we tested out a card reader. This was not only to enable us to contribute to a very worthwhile cause, Christian Aid, but also to see whether a card reader would be worthwhile for our long term use.

We found the reader to be very easy to use. It was preset for a donation of £5 (this could be varied). All we had to do was to tap our card on the reader and the donation was


automatically made.
It accepted payments
from Visa, Mastercard,
Applepay and Googlepay.
The magnificent sum
of £165 was raised in

only two weeks. At the end of this trial period we had a decision to make.

Should we return the reader to the supplier (at no cost to ourselves) or should we keep it for our long term use? This was discussed by the PCC and they agreed to go ahead and purchase the reader. I am delighted to say that some members of our congregation very generously agreed to meet the cost. I am very grateful to them for their support.

The card reader now belongs to the church and will shortly be located and available for use at the rear of the church during services. It will provide a convenient and simple way for us to support the work of our church. Gift Aid can be claimed on all donations - we don't even have to fill in a form or be a taxpayer. It's so easy to use – why not give it a try? Just 'Tap and Go'.

Outdoor Fun

DAY trips, visiting family or even going abroad all require some sort of travel. Whether it's on foot, on a bike, in the car, on a bus, train, or plane, the journey itself can be an opportunity to see new things and ask for God's blessing too.

Going to a different place is exciting for little children. The landscape, weather or the food might be very different. The world is a big place, an amazing place, full of new things to discover.

The Bible tells a story in which Abraham and Sarah set off on a long journey, and wondered whether God would be there when they arrived. They knew God was with them at home, but would God be where they were going? Getting to know...Bob & Margaret Baker Our new Organist & Choirmaster and his wife

MARGARET was born in Leeds and trained (RGN) in Harrogate. She then worked as a nurse at Christ's Hospital in Sussex, with a boarding community of about 1000; 800+boys & resident staff & their families. She rejoined the NHS and moved to Essex to qualify as a Midwife and Midwife Teacher and then returned to Leeds to teach at the Maternity Hospital.

Buying a new-build cottage in Otley was fortuitous as Bob moved into the same row of houses. His first message to Margaret was a note 'Dear no. 63, Do you know you have a slate loose?' Six months later Bob's house was sold, they were married and still live at an extended no.63 over 40 years later.

Two daughters led to involvement with Sunday School, Brownies, Guides & Youth Club at Otley Methodist. On Friday evenings often school friends from Woodhouse Grove came for tea, went to Youth Club and became part of the family for the week-end.

After leaving midwifery to be a full time Mum for 5 years, return was impossible; so Margaret did a parttime 'Back to Nursing' course and



worked for the Nurse Bank at Otley, Cookridge & the Convalescent Hospitals. This eventually resulted in full time work & a Certificate in Oncology nursing at Cookridge. However NHS shifts became less family-friendly and a Night Sister's post in a nursing/care home was a better option.



SHORTLY after I retired, I went to the Annual Village Meeting out of curiosity as I had no real idea how the village was managed or what Parish Councils do. An ex-colleague of mine, Peter Lawson, was already on the Council and so I was persuaded to stay behind after the meeting and chat. There was plenty of wine and everyone seemed very pleasant. Somehow, before the evening was over, I had agreed to put my name forward to be co-opted to a vacant seat. "Don't worry, you can do as little or as much as you wish," I was assured!

I didn't realise then just how much time I would be spending on village activities, or that I would end up as Vice-Chair. The last eight years as a Councillor have been full of interest and challenge, and memorable moments: helping build the enormous bonfire on the recreation ground for the Diamond Jubilee; frantically brushing up my editing skills when I took over the Village Newsletter; organising an exhibition of World War 1 memorabilia in St Giles Church Hall for the 2014 centenary; reading the lesson at the

Carol Service in the Puritan
Chapel; behind the scenes visits to the airport as the council's representative on the consultative committee; a Boxing Day spent producing 900 letters to residents to counteract yet another attempt to build at the end of Jubilee Copse; standing in wind and rain to identify the best location for the Kings Road Speed Indicator Device; and coordinating our plans for the visit of the Tour de Yorkshire.

Let me slay some dragons. The consensus in Social Media and the Press is that Parish Councillors are old fuddy-duddies who do nothing to justify their excessive allowances, sit through interminable meetings yet make no decisions, conduct meetings in secret, vote along party lines, and make perverse planning decisions in favour of their friends. In fact Parish Councillors are unpaid; Parish Councils are non-political; meetings are held in public and advertised in advance, declarations of interest are
