

Happy Easter! Easter greetings to you all.

For the world at large, Easter is a difficult holiday; first of all schools and employers want Easter at the same time every year and it isn't; the concept of Easter, Jesus dying and rising again is difficult. I mean we live in a society where the topic of death is not discussed and faith even less so- especially in resurrection.

However, difficulties with what Easter means is not only a 21st century problem but was a first century thing as well. On that first Easter morning the disciples were all over the place; Peter didn't know what to make of it, John the other disciple thought he knew immediately what it meant. The other disciples were in hiding. Mary Magdalene was upset, grieving and confused.

Blinded by tears, it wasn't until Jesus called her name that Mary knew it was Him. The tone of his voice, the familiar intonation of her name suddenly made it all make sense to her.

Does Easter make sense to you? Easter means Jesus is alive! Mary knew that - her message was simple. I have seen the Lord (John 20:18) she told the others. And when the disciples caught up and worked that out, and had too met with Jesus, and been blessed with the Holy Spirit, they went and told everyone they met.

Peter in Acts 10:36 onwards gives no theology; no explanations, just the simple message; you know Jesus, you know what he did in Galilee, how he went about doing good and healing, how they put him to death on a cross. But God raised Him from the dead. God raised Him from the dead. In

And that's the simple message of Easter, it's not difficult or confusing, but a message not just for the 1st century, or the 21st century but for all time. It is a message for all



people. God loves us and wants us to know His Son, He wants us to put our faith and trust in Jesus, who died that we might live. God wants us to have hope in Easter because Jesus is alive!





The story behind 'Thine be the glory'

ere is a hymn that is so well known and loved that it has simply burst the bounds of Easter, and gets sung regularly at other times of the year. It has two stories behind it.

First, the music. The rousing music did not start out as a hymn, but was written by Handel for his opera 'Judas Maccabeus', first performed in 1746. Originally the words ran 'See the conquering hero comes', for Handel's opera tells the story (found in the Apocrypha) of the leader of the Jews, Judas Maccabeus, who led an army against the Syrians and restored worship at the Temple. With its triumphant refrain after each verse, the music is easy to learn and sing, and can be (and has been!) played to great effect either by the trumpets, on an organ in a large resonant church, or even on guitars (!).

Secondly, the words. They were not written until 1884 – 138 years after the music. We owe them to the Rev Raymond Budry, a Swiss pastor from Lausanne. Ordained in the Free Evangelical Church in Vaud, he spent 35 years as the pastor of Vevey on Lake Geneva. Budry wrote the hymn in

French ('A Toi La Gloire!') to console himself after the death of his first wife, and a year later (1885) it was published in Chants Evangeliques. Soon it found its way into English – translated by a Baptist minister from Kingston-upon-Thames, Richard Hoyle. By 1904 it had made the YMCA Hymn Book, and was being translated into other languages.

It is not clear who first had the happy idea of teaming words and music, but when they did, the hymn really took off. The theme of 'battle' is never far from this hymn, whether it was the

battle of Indas Maccabeus. or the battle over sin which was won by Christ on the cross and in rising from the tomb. Easter, of course. marked the biggest victory over the biggest enemies of all time: sin and death.

What would

Handel make of it, if he could know that his battle music had become one of the world's most popular and well-known Easter hymns? He was a devout man, working for the poor, praying twice each day, and attending St Pauls' Cathedral. So it seems pretty certain that he would be delighted.



ay 1-3 has been confirmed, and made public, as the date for the new UCI 2.1 Europe Tour world-class cycle race – The Tour de Yorkshire.

Friday 1 May

Bridlington to Scarborough Saturday 2 May

Selby to York + women's race in York

Sunday 3 May

Wakefield to Leeds + mass participation 'sportive' starting and finishing in Roundhay Park.

The proposed route on 3 May will see the race get to Roundhay Park from the West via Otley, Pool, Arthington and Allwoodley with a finish in Roundhay Park at approximately 5pm. The route will feature two 'King of the Mountain' climbs in Leeds - on East Chevin Road and Black Hill Road.

Specifically the route will take the following route:
Bingley Road, Menston;
Buckle Lane, Menston; West Chevin Road, Otley;
Birdcage Walk, Otley; East Chevin Road, Otley;
Bramhope Old Lane, A658
Pool Bank New Road, A659
Arthington Lane, Black Hill

Wigton Lane, Wike Ridge
Lane, Roundhay Park Lane,
A6120 Ring Road

(Shadwell), A58 Wetherby Road, with the finish on Princes Avenue.

Unlike the Tour de France, road closures on the whole will be managed by the Police on a rolling road closure basis. This should mean a maximum closure period of 45-60 minutes as the race passes by, apart from at a small number of key points.

For the love of chocolate

Are you going to indulge in Easter chocolate this vear? Ever wonder where it first came from? We have the Aztecs of equatorial Central America to thank: it was they who discovered that a certain tree, later named Theobroma Cacao, was well worth cultivating. The Aztecs considered chocolate the 'drink of the gods' (Theo means God, broma means drink: hence the name). The Aztecs credited chocolate for everything from spiritual wisdom to sexual prowess; Emperor Montezuma is

reported to have drunk more than 50 flagons of the stuff each day.

The Spanish explorer Cortes also called it 'the divine drink', and the conquistadors brought chocolate back to Spain. From there it travelled north, and reached England about 1849. It was first served as a drink, until during the Industrial Revolution it caught the attention of several leading Quaker families, (including the Cadburys, the Frys, the Rowntress and the Terrys). It was the Fry family who



created the first 'eating' chocolate... and the rest, as they say, is history. Today the world eats about 600,000 tons a year. Enjoy your Easter egg!

The Queen brings Maundy Money to South Yorkshire

The Queen will distribute the Royal Maundy money at Sheffield Cathedral in April. This is the first time in over 900 years that this State Occasion has taken place in South Yorkshire.

She will be welcomed to the city's Church of England cathedral by a congregation of over 1,000 representatives from churches in South Yorkshire and organisations from the whole County. The Queen will then personally distribute a gift of Maundy Money to 178 individuals over the age of 70, in recognition of their service to

the church and community.

According to ancient tradition, the number of recipients and the amount of money are directly related to the Sovereign's age. Therefore, as Her Majesty is 89 years old, 89 men and 89 women will receive 89 pence in specially minted Maundy Money, together with a further gift, in two specially made leather purses. The money is specially struck by the Royal Mint for this service, and includes 3 pence pieces—which apparently are legal tender!

The General Election is almost upon us. How do we as Christians decide what kind of society we want and who we should vote for to achieve it? There is so much information out there much of it misinformation — how do we get a Christian perspective on all this?

Our first stop is of course the Gospels where Jesus tells us how we should live a Christian life. But how about our society as a whole? What values would we like our leaders to have, and what changes would we like to see so that we are governed in a way that reflects Christian values?

'On Rock or Sand', edited by the Archbishop of York. John Sentamu, has the subtitle 'Firm foundations for Britain's future'. The book is a collection of essays written by respected authorities over the last four years. Subjects covered include the economy, health, education, work, ageing and building for the future. It is written with clarity, knowledge and wisdom on these difficult subjects. The Introduction - 'Hope today for a Brighter Tomorrow' and the conclusion 'Firm Foundations for Britain's Future' are written by John

Sentamu. Read these even if you don't read the rest of it. Also the recently published letter, 'Who is my Neighbour' asks the question 'How should Christian men and women approach the General Election?' This document has received quite a bit of attention in the press, but does not tell us which party to vote for, but asks us to consider which policies we as Christians should support. I found it inspiring and hopeful. Maybe we should all read it not least because it is written by the leaders of our Church, the Church of England, and whether we agree with them or not we should perhaps listen to what they are saying. It can be found on and can be downloaded from the Church of England website. Good reading this month - if anyone would like to review a book from our library, please let me know.

St George - our patron saint who isn't English!

Ot's perhaps typical of the English that they should have a patron saint who isn't English, about whom next to nothing is known for sure, and who may not have existed at all. That didn't stop him being patriotically invoked in many battles, notably at Agincourt and in the Crusades, and of course it is his cross that adorns the flags of English football fans to this day.

It's most likely that he was a soldier, a Christian who was martyred for his faith somewhere in Palestine, possibly at Lydda, in the early fourth century. At some point in the early centuries of the Church he became associated with wider military concerns, being regarded as the patron saint of the Byzantine armies. There is no doubt that he was held as an example of the 'godly soldier', one who served Christ as bravely and truly as he served his king and country.

The story of George and the dragon is of much later date and no one seems to know where it comes from. By the middle ages, when George was being honoured in stained glass, the dragon had

become an invaluable and invariable visual element, so that for most people the two are inseparable. Pub signs have a lot to answer for here: 'The George and Dragon'.

However, it's probably more profitable to concentrate on his role as a man who witnessed to his faith in the difficult setting of military service, and in the end was martyred for his faithfulness to Christ.

The idea of the 'Christian soldier' was, of course, much loved by the Victorian hymn -writers - 'Onward, Christian soldiers!' The soldier needs discipline. The heart of his commitment is to obedience. The battle cannot be avoided nor the enemy appeared. He marches and fights alongside others, and he is loyal to his comrades. In the end, if the battle is won, he receives the garlands of victory, the final reward of those who overcome evil

St George's Day presents a challenge and an opportunity. The challenge is to distance the message of his life from the militarism



and triumphalism that can easily attach itself to anything connected to soldiers and fighting. The opportunity is to celebrate the ideal of the 'Christian soldier' - one who submits to discipline, sets out to obey God truly, does not avoid the inevitable battle with all that is unjust, wrong and hateful in our world, and marches alongside others fighting the same noble cause. Discipline, obedience. courage, fellowship and loyalty - they're not the most popular virtues today, but that doesn't mean that they don't deserve our gratitude and admiration.
