

Dear Friends

Easter Greetings and Happy Easter to you all.

I write this in the April magazine but in fact Easter Sunday was a few days ago in March. By the magic of print deadlines you will still receive this before Easter takes place. Throughout Lent we have been saying Easter is early this year as if it makes a difference to the Good News that Easter holds.

The fact is no matter when we celebrate Easter, early, late, on time (when is on time?), in the church there is great rejoicing. It is reflected in our music, our prayers and our bible readings. I met and chatted with Sue Hamilton who actually has taken these kits out to Nepal and was overwhelmed by their gratitude. 'Please bring us more' they said.

Most groups making these kits are small scale and I am looking at the possibility of doing it in Bramhope. Watch this space!

Dawn chorus

Jf you sleep with your bedroom window open, you will know all about the dawn chorus around now! The birds are busy establishing their territorial rights, and the 'early birds' have probably already selected a nest site and started building.

The blackbird builds a solid cup of twigs, plant stems and leaves, lined with a thick skin of mud covered with finer grasses and leaves. The long

tailed tit forms a soft hollow ball of mosses, hair and wool, with a tiny hole as entrance. The wrens do it differently, with the male wren sometimes building several nests before his finicky mate will accept one. He gets his revenge, though, because he sometimes installs a second wife in one of the rejected sites!



Mark - disciple, apostle, writer of the second gospel

ark, whose home in Jerusalem became a place of rest for Jesus and his 12 apostles, is considered the traditional author of the second gospel. He is also usually identified as the young man, described in Mark 14:51, who followed Christ after his arrest and then escaped capture by leaving his clothes behind.

Papias, in 130, said that in later years Mark became Peter's interpreter. If so, then this close friendship would have been how Mark gathered so much information about Jesus' life. Peter referred to him affectionately as his 'son'.

Mark was also a companion to Paul on his journeys. When Paul was held captive at Rome, Mark was with him, helping him. Mark's Gospel, most likely written in Italy, perhaps in Rome, is the earliest account we have of the life of Jesus. Mark died about 74 AD.

Early in the 9th century Mark's body was brought to Venice, whose patron he became, and there it has remained to this day. The symbol of Mark as an evangelist, the lion, is much in evidence at Venice.



Richard of Chichester

- wanting God more clearly, dearly and nearly

ver wonder where the prayer ... 'May I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day' comes from? Richard of Chichester, a bishop in the 13th century, wrote it.

He began life as Richard de Wych of Droitwich, the son of a yeoman farmer. But Richard was a studious boy, and after helping his father on the farm for several years, refused an advantageous offer of marriage, and instead made his way to Oxford, and later to Paris and Bologna to study canon law.

In 1235 he returned to Oxford, and was soon appointed Chancellor, where he supported Edmund, Archbishop of Canterbury, in his struggles against King Henry III's misuse of Church funds. After further study to become a priest, Richard was in due course made a bishop himself. He was greatly loved. He was charitable and accessible, both stern and merciful to sinners, extraordinarily generous to those stricken by famine, and a brilliant legislator of his diocese. He decreed that the sacraments

were to be administered without payment, Mass celebrated in dignified conditions, the clergy to be chaste, to practise residence, and to wear clerical dress. The laity was obliged to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days, and to know by heart the Hail Mary as well as the Lord's Prayer and the Creed.

Richard was also prominent in preaching the Crusade, which he saw as a call to reopen the Holy Land to pilgrims, not as a political expedition. He died at Dover on 3 April 1253. In art, Richard of Chichester is represented with a chalice at his feet, in memory of his having once dropped the chalice at Mass! One ancient English church is dedicated to him.

And, of course, he is author of that famous prayer, now set to popular music, which runs in full:

"Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ for all the benefits thou hast given me, for all the pains and insults which thou hast borne for me. O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly and follow thee more nearly, day by day."



1 ancy was born in Eccles, Manchester. Her father died when she was 3 months old, and her mother moved to Southport with two Aunts who took a grocery shop in Birkdale. Here Nancy grew up. She was educated at a local private school, and having a good solo voice, and a friend who was a good accompanist, used to travel around doing competitions and concerts. On leaving college, Nancy went to work for a firm of manufacturing chemists in Southport. She was keen on drama, as well as the singing and became a member of a church youth club, fortunate to be with some exceptionally talented youngsters, who wrote, produced and performed their own plays, films and pantomimes in the church hall, giving Nancy further opportunity to take on the things she enjoyed.

Bryan was born in Crewe, but having a Father who was a Vicar, moved to Crosby, Liverpool, then on to St. Helens, before arriving at

Southport where his Father was appointed Vicar of St. James, Birkdale. Here he met Nancy. Bryan was then at school at St. John's. Leatherhead, a keen sportsman playing cricket, rugby and fives for the school. Beyond Easter – The cross of victory

Colossians 2:8-15

hen the first Christians began to meet in secret in the catacombs of Rome, we know that they used to mark their meeting places with secret signs. One was the fish – whose initial letters, in Greek, stood for 'Jesus Christ, Son of God, Saviour.' Another, to begin with, was the cross.

But with the cross,

apparently, there was a problem – at least, for some. For to some the cross still stood for shame and defeat – whereas they knew themselves to be participants not in defeat, but in victory.

So they searched around for a sign that would turn the cross of shame into the cross of victory. They found it in the circlet of laurel leaves that was used to crown the victor's head in Roman games – the Gold medal of ancient times. So, with the circle round the centre, the cross of defeat was clearly seen for what it was – a cross of victory.

Our God has won, in Christ, a victory so vast that it surely deserves the clearest victory sign that we can find.....

So, what sort of sign can we raise, to celebrate the vastness of the victory that God has won in Christ? In

Breakfast - with Jesus Christ

"It is the Lord!" (John 21:7)

here is something very reassuring in the simple scene by Galilee's lake, described on that post-Easter morning. Taking place there was the birth of a mighty world-wide adventure that has not ended yet! Was there ever a breakfast like it? They'd been fishing all night, but in vain.... until they heard a distant call from the shore: "How are you doing, guys?" There is even the little detail in the instructions from the beach that it was to be on the right side of the boat that the net should be thrown out this time

That Stranger. That voice! Suddenly the net was full of wriggling fish. It was like coming in at the start of the film again – (see Luke 5:6). Then Peter's hundred yard splash to the shore... the charcoal fire and 'large' tilapia fish... the typical action of fishermen in counting the catch – how we love the Bible, with its teeming stories. And now breakfast on the beach, with Jesus Christ! It was a re-commissioning for the apostle Peter, who only days earlier had denied any knowledge of Jesus.

From now on it would be different. "Feed my sheep," said Jesus.

- 1. Whose call but Christ's call? Peter would never be the same again. Those who have truly heard the call of Christ, will still be standing firm when revolutions explode, when finances plunge, when a church falls apart.
- 2. Whose word but Christ's word? 'Feed my sheep,' were His words. Whoever we may be teaching, Christ's servant is to see to it that what is taught is Christ's word and not one's own. The power that brings


