

From the Vicarage

It's not often that we find in the listings films about Jesus. They are few and far between so it was with some surprise that I found not one but two films about Jesus on the small screen over Christmas.

So he (Joseph) got up, took the child and his mother during the night and left for Egypt, where he stayed until the death of Herod. Matthew 2:14-15

The first film is about the missing years of Jesus and how it was imagined that he became conscious of who he was, not the son of Joseph and Mary but the Son of God. The film was called the Young Messiah. It had a reasonable premise and started out in a Jewish community in Egypt with a young Jesus conscious that he was different but no knowledge of who he was. The film centred on the search that continued for the New Born King even after the slaughter of the innocents in Bethlehem. Sean Bean is the centurion with the unenviable task of seeking the missing King.

"Take a guard," Pilate answered. "Go, make he tomb as secure as you know how." So they went and made the tomb secure by putting a seal on the stone and posting a guard. Matthew 27:65-66

The second film is called Risen with Joseph Fiennes as the Roman tribune Clavius who is ordered by Pontius Pilate to find out what happened to the body of Jesus. During a raid through a Jewish enclave, Clavius unexpectedly discovers a seemingly resurrected Yeshua with his apostles in a solitary place. Clavius calls off the search; he disperses his troops without revealing to them his personal encounter with the risen Yeshua.

Clavius assists the disciples in evading the Roman search party; he consequently witnesses the healing of a leper, and then the ascension of Jesus into Heaven. Later, communicating his travels to a stranger in a remote dwelling, Clavius acknowledges the vivifying wisdom which he observed through Yeshua, feeling he will never be the same.

What appropriate viewing for Lent. The mystery of the resurrection and what followed after has kept people thinking, seeking and discovering Jesus ever since.

Jesus still provides the opportunity for us to have a personal encounter with Him, but he doesn't make us believe we are not asked to leave our brains and our senses out of our search. On the contrary he wants us to question, debate, think through the God question, the resurrection and what happened after the cross.

There is no time like Lent to put our brains into gear, think more about our faith, put our faith in our faith so we can pray and study more, leading us to worship and adore Him.

I hope that you will find time during Lent to come to a Lent group and learn more about your faith and come closer to God.

May God Bless you as you seek to deepen your faith, may the Holy Spirit bless you and guide you through the Lenten period.

Women's World Day of Prayer

On Friday March 3 over 5000 services will be held in the British Isles on the theme of

'Am I being unfair to you?' The Christian women of the Philippines wrote the service and it has been translated into 1000 different languages and dialects, to be used throughout the world. Starting at sunrise on the island of Samoa and continuing until sunset off the coast of American Samoa.

In 2013, Typhoo Haiyan – named locally as 'Yolanda' – struck the Philippine Islands in the western Pacific Ocean. This is mentioned in the service but you will also hear the stories of a girl, a mother and an older woman, recounting their

situations and their hopes and fears. The service focusses on the Bible story of the workers in the vineyard: (Matthew 20 v 1-16). There is a reflection on the artwork designed by Rowena 'Apol' Laxamana-Sta.Rosa. It is very thought-provoking and illustrates contrasting scenes.

The Day of Prayer is not just for women. Everyone is welcome to attend the service. The Bramhope service will be held in the Methodist church.

ASH Wednesday this year will be on 1 March and thus begins Lent! Our Lent Course this year will be based on 'Pilgrim – A course for the Christian Journey'.

So, what is a Lent Course actually for? It is good to discuss issues of faith with fellow Christians at any time of the year, but Lent is traditionally a time of prayer and fasting to prepare for Easter, and a Course is also another way to prepare for the most joyous and central celebration in our faith.

Pilgrim is a new teaching and discipleship course from the Church of England, started in 2013. Its authors include Stephen Cottrell, Bishop of Chelmsford and Paula Gooder, a lecturer and member of the General Synod. Many others have contributed to writing the course and preparing the individual sessions, including our very own Bishop Nick Baines. The course approach is described as 'participation rather than persuasion' in the way people are encouraged to engage.

Pilgrim has two stages and we will be following the second 'Grow' stage which is aimed at people who wish to go further on their journey to develop their faith (the first stage of the course is for people very new to faith).

Pilgrim's approach is Christ-centred and flows



from study of the Scriptures. In the early church, faith was taught through the transmission of key texts from the Bible. Pilgrim restores this approach for the twenty-first century. The four sessions of the course are entitled 'The Creeds', 'The Eucharist', The Bible' and 'Church & Kingdom'. It looks like a great way to further our individual faith in community with other church members, and as a result encourage the growth and vibrancy of our own church community.

So very soon in a lobby near you there will appear sign up forms for this Lent Course. As always, there will be a choice of days, times and venues, and there will certainly be a session to suit EVERYONE in the congregation and beyond. I think it looks very exciting.

You can find out a lot more about the course at pilgrimcourse.org or by asking Janice. We look forward to making this pilgrim journey together as a church.








And so, dear friend, who happens to be packing your parachute today?


Just consider that everyone has someone who provides what they need to make it through the day.



Mothers '









From the library shelf

FEBRUARY, when there is a hint of spring in the air, snowdrops in bloom, and when, on the 14^{th,} we celebrate St. Valentine's Day. This is an official feast day in the Anglican church, which we observe, according to Wikipedia, by 'Sending greeting cards and gifts, dating, and church services', and which has become (like Christmas and Easter) a huge commercial opportunity.

It is a celebration of romantic love, and of course any celebration of love should be welcomed; it also prompts us to think about what love really means. I have two books for you this month, both about love. The first is 'The Four Loves', by C S Lewis, first published in 1960; it is interesting to read it now, 57 years later. At first sight it may seem somewhat dated, but it has lost none of its impact; the ideas, and the wisdom that supports them are as relevant now as they were then.

In the Introduction, the author distinguishes two different types of love - Gift-Love and Need-love: 'The typical example of Gift-love would be that love which moves a man to plan and save for the future well-being of his family which he will die without sharing or seeing; of the second (Need-love) that which sends a lonely or frightened child to his mother's arms.' This is followed by a second chapter dealing with the love of things — for example pleasure and patriotism — and how these can become more important to us than the love of God.

Those two chapters set the scene for the next four chapters which are concerned with the four different kinds of human; Affection, Friendship, Eros and Charity (Agape -the love of God.) The author gives a full and honest account of human love, not just its virtues but its pitfalls. If you think



you know what love means, then read this and you will think again. It gives a different perspective on how we love (or not). You will need to stomach the sexist examples used, especially in the chapter on friendship. These now seem dated, if not offensive, but remember that this was written by a male academic in a male-dominated institution (Oxford University), when society was even less kind to women than it is now!

The last chapter is about Charity, the unconditional and transforming love of God, and how we need this if our human love is to be truly fulfilled, for as Lewis says 'God is Love'. We are reminded that love does not protect us from heartbreak and suffering:

'To love at all is to be vulnerable. Love anything and your heart will certainly be wrung and possibly be broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact, you must give your heart to no one, not even to an animal. Wrap it carefully round with hobbies and little luxuries; avoid all entanglements; lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness. But in that casket-safe, dark, motionless, airless - it will change. It will not be broken; it will become unbreakable, impenetrable, irredeemable.'

Even after 57 years this book is still well worth reading!

Now to my second book, 'Agape Love Stories', by John Sentamu. It is also about the love of God, specifically how people have experienced His love in their lives, and how their lives have changed in response to that love. 22 people have contributed to this book; all have experienced life-changing experiences, some of them so tragic it is hard to see how they have survived. They range from Jean Vanier who founded the L'Arche communities to Gee Walker whose son was murdered in 2005.

Each chapter has a short biography of the contributor, followed by a bible passage and a commentary by John Sentamu, before a longer passage from the contributors themselves.

This is an interesting, sometimes heart-rending book, a real insight into how God's love overcomes suffering and tragedy and transforms lives.

Please read this book - it will inspire you!
