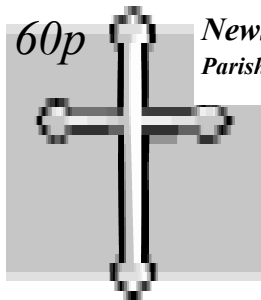

Dear Friends

When Jesus was baptised by John in the river Jordan he was blessed by the Holy Spirit and a voice came from heaven saying 'You are my Son whom I love; with you I am well pleased.'

The Holy Spirit is essential to baptism because it equips us; it sends us out to be active and dedicated disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ. The first thing that happens after Jesus baptism is that the Holy Spirit sends Jesus out into the wilderness. The word used is lead. Jesus was led by the Spirit.

The time of Lent is upon us and are we ready to be led out into that metaphorical wilderness as we accompany Jesus in his trials and temptations through Lent?

Are we ready to commit ourselves to a discipline for Lent either giving up or taking up or taking on something extra during Lent that will strengthen and support us in our journey of faith not just through lent but in our Christian life after Lent has finished?

Lent is a time of reflection, fasting and prayer – it is modelled on the story from Matthew's gospel chapter 4 where Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil. The bible tells us

that 'After fasting 40 days and 40 nights, he was hungry' a perfect understatement.

It may be an understatement but does give us a clue as to how we are to reflect to the outside world our discipline for Lent. It should be without fuss, without show and we should try to do it so that that only we and God know what we are doing for Lent.

Everyone is welcome to join us and mark the start of the days of Lent.

Our Lent groups will take place again in each others homes. It is not just an opportunity to learn more about our faith but a time of fellowship and growing together as a church. This year there will also be an afternoon group for those who do not want to come out in the evenings.

Whatever we decide to do for Lent may God bless your endeavours and give you strength to persevere.

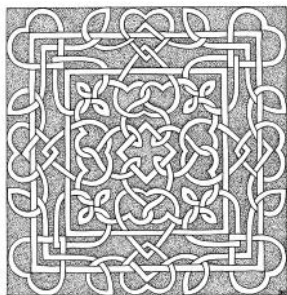

Ash Wednesday

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. But why 'Ash' Wednesday? The reason has to do with getting things right between you and God, and the tradition goes right back to the Old Testament.

In the Old Testament, the Israelites often sinned. When they finally came to their senses, and saw their evil ways as God saw them, they could do nothing but repent in sorrow. They mourned for the damage and evil they had done. As part of this repentance, they covered their heads with ashes. For the Israelites, putting ashes on your head, and even rending your clothes, was an outward sign of their heart-felt repentance and acknowledgement of sin. (See Genesis 18:27; 2 Samuel 13:19; Job 2:8, 30:19; Isaiah 58:5; Jeremiah 6:26; Jonah 3:6)

In the very early Christian Church, the yearly 'class' of penitents had ashes sprinkled over them at the beginning of Lent. They were turning to God for the first time, and mourning their sins. But soon many other Christians wanted to take part in the custom, and to do so at the very start of Lent. They heeded Joel's call to 'rend

your hearts and not your garments' (Joel 2:12-19). Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

The collect for today goes back to the Prayer Book, and stresses the penitential character of the day. It encourages us with the reminder of the readiness of God to forgive us and to renew us.

The Bible readings for today are often Joel 2:1-2, 12 – 18, Matthew 6: 1-6, 16 – 21 and Paul's moving catalogue of suffering, "as having nothing and yet possessing everything." (2 Corinthians 5:20b - 6:10)

The actual custom of 'ashing' was abolished at the Reformation, though the old

name for the day remained. Today, throughout the Church of England, receiving the mark of ashes on one's forehead is optional. Certainly the mark of ashes on the forehead reminds people of their mortality: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you will return..." (Genesis 3:19)

The late medieval custom was to burn the branches used on Palm Sunday in the previous year in order to create the ashes for today.

105th Archbishop of Canterbury

It has been 10 years since we last had a new Archbishop of Canterbury. Here we introduce the man

The Right Reverend Justin Welby, Bishop of Durham, will be enthroned as the 105th Archbishop of Canterbury in Canterbury Cathedral on 21st March. Dr Rowan Williams retired at the end of December, after ten years as Archbishop.

Bishop Welby admits: "To be nominated to this post is both astonishing and exciting. It is something I never expected, and the last few weeks have been a very strange experience. It is exciting because we are at one of those rare points where the tide of events is turning, and the church nationally, including the Church of England has great opportunities to match its very great but often hidden strengths.

"I feel a massive sense of privilege at being one of those responsible for the leadership of the church in a time of spiritual hunger, when our network of parishes and churches and schools and above all people means that we are facing the toughest issues in the toughest place."

So – what is the new Archbishop like? Where

does he come from?

Born in 1956 in London, the Right Reverend Justin Welby was educated at Eton College and Trinity College, Cambridge, where he studied history and law. For 11 years - five in Paris and six in London – he worked in the oil industry, becoming group treasurer of a large British exploration and production company. He focused mainly on West African and North Sea projects. During this period he became a lay reader at Holy Trinity, Brompton in London, having been a council member at St Michael's Church in Paris.

His father's family were German Jewish immigrants who moved to England to escape anti-Semitism in the late 19th century, and integrated quickly. His British ancestors, on his mother's side, include several clergymen.

A major influence both on Justin and his wife Caroline was their experience of personal tragedy. In 1983 their seven-month old daughter died in a car crash in France. Six years later in 1989, after sensing a call from God, Bishop Justin stood down from industry to

train for ordination.

He took a theology degree at St John's College, Durham, in which he focused on ethics – particularly in business. He has since published articles on ethics, international finance and reconciliation. His booklet, 'Can Companies Sin?', drawing on his experience in the oil industry, evolved from his dissertation at theological college. He has frequently said that the Roman Catholic approach to Christian social teaching, beginning with the encyclical of Leo XIII's *Rerum Novarum*, up to Pope Benedict XVI's *Caritas Veritate*, has greatly influenced his social thinking.

For 20 years, Justin Welby's ministry has blended deep devotion to his parish communities with church work around the world, especially in areas of conflict. After being ordained Deacon in 1992, he spent 15 years serving Coventry Diocese. His curacy was at All Saints Chilvers Coton with St Mary the Virgin Astley, in Nuneaton. In 1995 he became Rector of St James, Southam, a small market

town in the same Diocese – and also the next year at St Michael and All Angels, Ufton, the neighbouring parish. He helped revive both churches, growing their congregations and launching bereavement and baptism teams, among other things.

Between 2000 and 2002 he also chaired an NHS hospital trust in South Warwickshire.

In 2002, he was made a Canon of Coventry Cathedral, where he ran the reconciliation work based there. With Canons Andrew White and Stephen Davis, he worked extensively in the field in Africa and the Middle East. He has a particular interest in Kenya, the DRC and Nigeria, where he was and remains involved in work with groups involved in conflict in the north. In the Niger Delta, he has worked on reconciliation with armed groups.

He met with religious and political leaders in Israel and Palestine, and on one trip to Baghdad reopened the Anglican Church with Canon Andrew White, shortly after the allied invasion. In 2006 he also took responsibility for Holy Trinity Coventry, the main city centre church, as Priest-in-charge.

When he left Coventry, he was installed Dean of Liverpool on 8 December 2007, replacing the Right Reverend Rupert Hoare. Liverpool Cathedral is the largest cathedral in England. Its local area, Toxteth, is among the most deprived in north-west Europe. During his deanship, he brought the Cathedral into much greater contact with its local community, working with asylum seekers and in partnership with neighbouring churches. The Cathedral also hosted events from a TUC rally to royal services. Over his four years, during which he also continued to work on reconciliation and mediation projects overseas, the Cathedral's congregation increased significantly.

In 2011, Justin Welby returned to the place where his journey towards becoming Archbishop began: on 2 June 2011, he was announced as the new Bishop of Durham, taking over from the Right Reverend Tom Wright. He was enthroned at Durham Cathedral on 26 November 2011, and drew parallels between Liverpool and Durham – noting both the struggles and the enduring spirit of the two places.

On 9 November 2012, the Right Reverend Justin Welby was announced as the 105th Archbishop of the See of Canterbury.

An expert on the politics and history of Kenya and Nigeria, he has lectured on reconciliation at the US State Department. In the summer of 2012, he was asked to join the Parliamentary Commission on Banking Standards.

His interests include French culture, sailing and politics. He is married to Caroline, who studied Classics at Cambridge, where they met. They have two sons and three daughters.

Slithers of Gold

This is one of my favourite hymns which I would like to share with you. Both the music and words are written by John Bell of the Iona Community and those of you who listen to 'Thought for the Day' on Radio 4 will have heard his voice.

It is a lovely hymn to sing at the beginning of the day, the year, or indeed at the start of any new venture. It tells of the eternal presence of God with us to help and encourage. Like a lot of hymns which draw on what might be called a Celtic tradition, it concentrates on the Trinity, not the easiest concept to understand however!

Whenever I sing this hymn I am reminded of singing it at the 9am service in Iona Abbey. The huge east window there looks over the Sound of Mull, and either the sun is blazing through or the rain and wind are lashing at the glass. More often than not it is 'glory in grey' rather than 'slithers of gold', as is normal for the Western Isles!

Today I awake and God is before me.
At night, as I dreamt, God summoned the day;
For God never sleeps but patterns the morning
With slithers of gold or glory in grey.

Today I arise and Christ is beside me.
He walked through the dark to scatter new light.
Yes, Christ is alive, and beckons his people
To hope and to heal, resist and invite.

Today I affirm the Spirit within me
At worship and work, in struggle and rest.
The Spirit inspires all life which is changing
From fearing to faith, from broken to blest.

Today I enjoy the Trinity round me,
Above and beneath, before and behind;
The Maker, the Son, the Spirit together
They called me to life and call me their
friend.

Few of those who send or receive them realise that February 14th is actually the feast day of St Valentine. That's hardly surprising, as we know very little about the person the day commemorates. In fact, there were two Christian martyrs of that name, both living in

the third century, one a soldier and the other a bishop. No one has ever successfully found any link at all between either of them and courting couples and their desperate hopes.

The most likely explanation of the association of this date with hopeful lovers is a very old tradition (at least as old as Chaucer) that birds begin to pair on February 14th - St Valentine's Day. As they noisily go about choosing their mates, young men and women pursue a rather subtler, if more circuitous route to the same end.

Whatever its provenance, Valentine's Day at least reminds us of the irresistible force of love. 'Love changes everything', as the song says - or, as the Beatles put it, 'All you need is love'. The problem then becomes interpretation. In English the one word 'love' covers everything, from sexual intercourse to motherly care, from close friendship to a lifelong partnership. Happily, the Greeks have more than one word for it.

So the New Testament is able to establish that eros (sexual attraction), philadelphia (friendship) and agape (sacrificial love) are distinct qualities, yet all are



part of the mysterious and wonderful chemistry of human love in its fullest sense.

'All that I am I give to you', the couple say to each other in the wedding service. What a thing to promise! And yet what a testimony to the deepest possible understanding of the love of God for us, and (in our better moments) of human love in all its tenderness, commitment and unselfishness. So physical attraction plus true friendship plus self-giving love add up to - well, everything that the Bible means when it says that 'those who live in love live in God, and God lives in them'(1 John 4:16). Happy Valentine's Day!

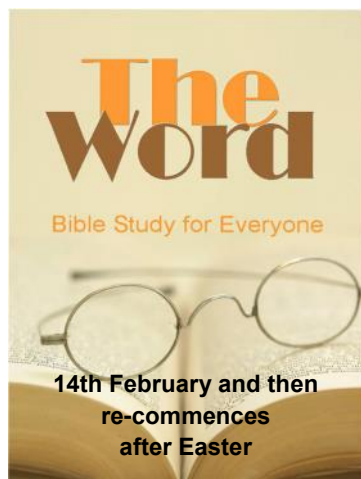

Give a bird a home

National Nest Box Week 14 - 21 February

Here is an excellent chance for you to encourage birds in your garden to come home to roost. Literally. Organised by the British Trust for Ornithology (www.bto.org), National Nest Box Week aims to encourage people to protect the bird life we still have in the UK.

National Nest Box Week started in 1997. As more trees have been cut down in recent decades, birds have lost their natural homes, and can struggle to raise a family. Putting up a nest box is a great way of helping them. Response has been so positive that nowadays there are between five and six million boxes across the UK.

Don't worry if you've never

put up a bird box before. Visit the website to find lots of tips on how to get started, as well as information on how to build/buy the box, and what to do then. Different types of boxes attract different types of birds. Small holes in nest boxes will attract blue tits, great tits, nuthatches and house sparrows. Large boxes with holes will attract starlings, greater spotted woodpeckers and even little owls. An open fronted box will attract robins and pied wagtails. Very big boxes attract, amongst others, kestrels, jackdaws and tawny owls.

adopting a box in one of seven regions across the country. During the breeding season conservationists carefully monitor the boxes, and report on the birds who have moved in. Nest boxes can be as big as a kennel, and require expert installation. Sometimes eggs are laid and young are reared. Sometimes a box set up for barn owls has another family move in, instead: tawny owls, little owls and kestrels have become happy lodgers. The nests of all birds of prey are protected, and barn owls have additional legal protection. Visit: www.hawkandowl.org

Housing crisis – for barn owls

Catching sight of a barn owl flitting through the dusk is a magical but increasingly elusive experience.... in the past 80 years, the number of barn owls has declined by more than 70 per cent.

A major problem is that nowadays barn owls struggle to find somewhere to call

'home'. The loss of old hollow trees and the conversion of barns into houses all over the country has dramatically reduced the supply of traditional nesting sites for these wonderful birds. It is estimated that as many as four in every five barn owls now use nestboxes.

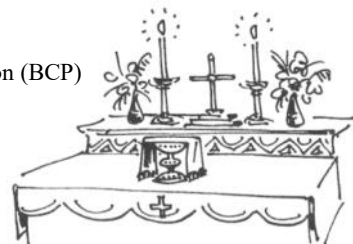
