





The Seven Sleepers of Ephesus

-proving a nap is good for you!

Po you tend to avoid conflict? When you feel stressed, do you crave sleep? Then the Seven Sleepers of Ephesus would be good patron saints for you. But -you may find it hard to copy their successful method of avoiding trouble!

Legend has it that The Seven Sleepers were third century Christians who lived in Ephesus during the persecutions of the Roman Emperor Decius. When things got very bad, the Seven Sleepers decided to 'go to ground'. Literally. They found a cave on the outskirts of the city and walled themselves in. The story goes that then God simply put them to sleep.

200 years later they woke up, and peeped out of the cave again. Things had changed: Ephesus had converted to Christianity. Unfortunately the Seven Sleepers did not get much time to enjoy the new freedoms, because within a short time they all died – of extreme old age.

The story was popularised in the 6th century by Gregory of Tours and Jacob of Sarugh, who venerated the Seven Sleepers as saints. But it was challenged by Baronius and many scholars since. It is sometimes called a Christianised pagan or Jewish legend akin to Rip Van Winkle.

A possible moral for anyone today is that when you find yourself in a storm of conflict, you don't have to fight all the battles yourself. You can indeed seek refuge

in God. He may not put you to sleep for 200 years, but he will be a safe hiding place for your soul.

St Swithin

Ccording to Old English folklore, if it rains on St Swithin's day, the weather will be wet for 40 days and 40 nights.

The day is named after a 9th century Anglo-Saxon bishop who asked to be buried outside Winchester Cathedral so the rain could fall on him.

But in 971, when monks moved his body to an inner shrine, the day was marked by heavy downpours which lasted the next six weeks.

Since then, rainfall on July 15 has been taken as a prediction of weather to come.

After his relics were broken up in 1538, his head ended up in Canterbury while an

to Peterborough.

Historians suggest that the legend has its origins in a heavy downpour which began on St Swithin's day in 1315.

And despite skepticism surrounding the tale, there is apparently some scientific basis to the myth.

In mid-July, the jet stream which influences British weather settles into a pattern which continues to the end of August.

The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath. She had few dresses and it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and aprons required less material.

But along with that:

- it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.
- it was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning out dirty ears,
- it was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs from the chicken coop, to be finished in the warming oven,
- it was an ideal hiding place for shy kids when company came,
- it kept Grandma warm when the weather was cold wrapped around her arms. it wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove,
- it carried chips and kindling wood into the kitchen.
- it carried all sorts of

- vegetables from the garden and after the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls.
- it held the apples that had fallen from the trees in the autumn,
- it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds when unexpected company drove up the road,
- it was her apron that Grandma waved out on the porch to tell the men folk it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

How do you pray? Or how-do-you-do?

Each week we pray in church. We use different postures while we pray:- kneeling, sitting, or standing. These postures may well affect our thinking and attitude to God. What we say, whether that be out loud or in our thoughts, also reflects our relationship with God.

If all we do is come to him with a 'shopping list' of requests, whoever they are for, we're like young children who sit on their daddy's knee in order to get what they want. We are always asking for something bigger and better; the latest style and colours. We are never satisfied with what we have. We don't want a relationship with God; we want what we hope he will give us.

On the other hand, we may approach him only formally. We acknowledge with respect his power and greatness. But where do we go from there? How can such a far away, powerful God, have any interest in us? We have no idea, and so our prayers are brief, rarely acknowledging the ache in our hearts, and the needs in our lives.

Give-me-give-me?

The Bible shows a middle way: between the 'give me give me' prayers, and the prayers which hesitate to ask for anything at all. The Psalmist made clear that our prayers come out of our relationship with God. "The Lord is near to all those who call upon him, to all that call upon him in truth. He will fulfill the desire of those who fear him: he also will hear their cry, and will save them. The Lord preserves all those who love him, but all the wicked will he destroy." (Ps 145:18-20)

So the key is this: if you really want God, then just tell him so. Be honest. From the depths of your inner self, call upon him. Acknowledge your sins, and ask for forgiveness. Then see what happens. Jesus promised: "Seek and you SHALL find. Knock and the door SHALL be opened unto you." (Matt 7:7)

What is this life if, full of care



What is prayer?

Effective prayer seems to require a heart that desires to please God, even when there's no commandment involved. A child who loves a parent or grandparent will occasionally do something totally un-required, just in order to please them. Any parent or grandparent is delighted when a small child gives them something – be it only a crayon drawing, and totally undecipherable. What matters to parents is that the young child gave it spontaneously, from their heart, without any prompting.

Perhaps this is the kind of communication with us that pleases God—when we simply learn to enjoy his presence, and find our

Calling all Teenagers!

Martin Saunders, a youth ministry specialist, was asked to interview a selection of young people, to let them tell their own stories of how they have encountered Jesus Christ. Martin Saunders has specialised in youth ministry for a number of years, and is currently a volunteer youth worker based in Reigate, Surrey. He is the author of five books on Christian youth work including 'Youth work from scratch', and is the editor of Youthwork magazine. He is a co-founder of the Youthwork Summit event, and the new magazine Childrenswork.

TEEN meets GOD: Ben's story

Ben, is 17 years old and lives in Surrey. He was having major family problems when something unexpected happened...here is his true story, as told to Martin Saunders, a youth worker.

"I've struggled with dark thoughts for a few years now. Since I was 14, my parents have argued pretty much non-stop, and they don't seem to care that my brother and I are in the house. There's other stuff too - my brother is much more popular and successful than me, and I suffer at school for being bad at exams. So that's why the thoughts came into my head about hurting or harming myself - because deep down I didn't really like myself very much. That's also why I always wear black.

"Or I used to, anyway. Last Summer, my church youth leader persuaded me to go away with the group to a Christian camp. When we arrived, I found out that every day would include two long meetings like church services. To be honest, I wasn't looking forward to them at all. But when I went along, I had a massive surprise: I met with God.

"On the first evening, someone asked if they could pray for me. As they did, I started crying. Not just a little bit – I was bawling my eyes out. This wasn't like me, but I couldn't help myself. All the anger and frustration and sadness I'd been feeling just came pouring out. It wasn't just that though; there was something else. I started to feel a warmth; like I was getting a hug from within... like all the bad stuff was coming out, and being replaced by something good. Then I did something that I almost never did - I started smiling.

"I don't completely understand what happened, but I know that somehow, I was touched by God. I know now that I'm not alone when things are tough at home and at school.

"The next day, I went along to the camp's shop, still dressed in black. They sold hoodies there, and so I picked the most colourful



one they had. My way of saying to God: I know you've changed me. It's still my favourite jumper."

Ben made a decision to follow Jesus. He prayed, asking God to forgive him for the things he does wrong, and then he promised to live God's way.





Mothers' Union

We enjoyed a fascinating and informative talk by Canon Ann Hemsworth about Florence Nightingale at our June meeting. Born in Florence in 1820 to a wealthy family, she became convinced as a young woman that she was called by God to fulfil a great cause. At which point she made a positive decision to never marry. Eventually she felt she was called to nursing and in 1854 went to the Crimea with a team of 38 nurses who were not at all welcome in the filthy military hospitals where disease killed more soldiers than their injuries. She campaigned tirelessly to improve conditions and used her influence to raise money and have wagon-loads of goods sent from England and she did walk round the wards late at night with her lamp! Most of her work was done on her return to England in 1856 where she was often bedridden but still driven by the conviction that she had to improve facilities in hospitals, cleanliness and training for nurses. She was a lover all her life of mathematics and statistics and became the first woman to be a fellow of the Royal Statistical Society.

She died aged 90 leaving a legacy of over 200 books on good nursing and medical procedures and her name given to the Nightingale wards.

Queen's Hotel celebrates 150 years!

The Queens Hotel in Leeds is one of the last great English railway hotels to be built. In their day these were the Grand Hotels of their time, reflecting the importance of the railways as instruments of a new mobility and social change.

Built in 1937 and replacing a building that had been on the site since 1861, the importance of the new building was reflected in the appointment of architects William Curtis Green RA and William Hamlyn FRIBA, who were also the designers of the Dorchester in London's Park Lane. The Queens had the distinction of being the first hotel in Britain built with en-suite bathrooms to every room. The last of the railway hotels in public ownership, the hotel passed via the old Forte

group eventually to its present owners and operator, 'O' Hotels.

Built in brick and Portland stone on a steel frame, on opening the cost of a room was 10 shillings and sixpence for single occupancy - in today's money about 52p or \$1. The rooms were also supplied with what is described as 'filtered air', an equivalent to the current air conditioning perhaps. The hotel's importance was reflected in the multi page spread devoted to the hotel's opening on November 12th 1937 by the local paper. The costs were reputed to be £500,000 (then about \$2 million).




