This month we welcome Bishop John Packer for a confirmation service at St



Can I make a plea to all who come to St Giles to remember our neighbours? Please avoid parking in the places marked with cones on Church Hill. This would help make Church


Hill less hazardous for *all* road users.

St Columba - Colum the dove (521-597)

nolumba was born in C Donegal into a princely family and was educated as a monk in the monastery of Clonard. The story goes that he had an argument with a fellow monk over copyright of an illustrated psalter; a bloody battle resulted during which many men were killed. As a consequence. Columba was exiled from Ireland and set out with 12 companions in 563 to find the nearest place from which he could no longer see his native Ireland. He ended up on the island of Iona in the Inner Hebrides, You can imagine him arriving there, far from home, exiled and isolated, and it was probably raining! Indeed the green streaked pebbles on the beach where Columba landed on Iona are known as 'Columba's tears'. He established a monastery on Iona in the Irish Celtic tradition, evangelising throughout Scotland and the north of England. The Celtic tradition in the north of England gave us many of the 'Northern' saints including St Aidan, St Cuthbert and St Oswald.

Columba died on 9 June 587 and was buried on Iona. His relics became a powerful symbol of Scottish nationhood. They were carried before the Scottish army in battle, notably in 1314 at Bannockburn, when the Scots sent Edward II 'homewards, to think again'. I wonder if Mr Salmond has put in a bid for them?

Most of what we know about Columba comes from writings by the Venerable Bede and by Adomnan, who was the ninth Abbot of Iona. They tell the story of a brave and warlike evangelist and scholar, who once had a tussle with the Loch Ness monster – the final score was Columba 1, Nessie 0, as the



monster was banished to the depths of the Loch by Columba after it had killed one of his disciples. Maybe that is why sightings of the monster are so rare today?

The Iona Community has produced a liturgy for this



year to celebrate the 1450th anniversary of the arrival of Columba on Iona. Its title is 'Bell, Book and Candle'. which sounds a bit dire. But it is not quite as grim as it sounds. The Bell calls us to worship and suffer for our faith, the Book teaches us our faith, and also brings to mind the Book of Kells. written by monks on Iona, and the Candle represents our evangelism throughout the world. The liturgy ends with this blessing:

And now may kindly Columba guide you

To be an isle in the sea
To be a hill on the shore
To be a star in the night
To be a staff for the weak
Amen.

So what's Ordination all about?

Over the next few weeks, Ordination Services will be held across the Church of England, as men and women are ordained as deacons and priests. But what is this call to ministry all about?

Of course, every Christian is called to be a disciple of Jesus Christ and to live out that discipleship in ways which make the most of his or her unique blend of gifts, personality and situation. However, for some this is expressed in a call to ordained ministry within the wider church. A key to understanding this is found in Paul's words to the Ephesians:

'So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.' (Eph 4:11-13).

The role of leadership is to equip and enable all God's people to be actively engaged in the work of ministry, rather than simply the leaders.


In the Church of England, there is a 'threefold order' of ordained ministry: bishops, priests and deacons. This reflects what we find in the Pastoral Epistles, where Paul identifies two roles within the church, 'presbyter' or 'bishop' (the terms being used interchangeably for leaders in the church), and 'deacon', involving being set aside (ordained) for a particular serving role. A person who is accepted for ordination as a priest is first ordained as a deacon. Then, after a period of normally a year, he or she is ordained to the priesthood. This reminds us that humble service is always at the heart of priestly ministry.

their potential as they witness to Christ in the world. It is also about living lives which point to the life of Christ crucified and risen, encouraging all God's people to show love, care and compassion and to strive for justice and peace.

It is a challenging and significant role within the life of the church. So do pray for those are preparing for this significant step in their own lives in the near future.

Responses of the Heart

"This is the meaning of the parable: The seed is the word of God" (Luke 8: 11) I was phoning London from Zimbabwe, after visiting the famous Victoria Falls. "Have vou seen it?" I was asked. "Yes." I replied. Next -"Have you photographed it?" "Yes!" "All of it?" "Ah," I said, "You don't know what you're asking. It's the biggest thing I've ever seen. It's a mile across! All you can do is take individual snaps. But I can tell you – it's the best thing I've ever seen in my life!"

When it comes to the biggest thing in the whole world the kingdom of God – it's much the same principle. Rather than give an overall theological definition of God's kingdom, Jesus would tell parable after parable, so giving to his listeners a series of snap shots -of the Kingdom.

Here in Luke 8 he's taking snaps of the human heart as it comes into contact with God's word.

First we learn of: The shut heart of hard unresponsive soil (v.5) The 'path' here was trodden down and beaten flat; any seed that fell, the birds got. This is what happens in a heart that over time has

become impervious to God's word. The seed is quickly whisked away and produces nothing.

But then there is: The shallow heart of rocky soil (v. 6) This seems to represent the individual who has some kind of flirtation with the Gospel. It becomes apparent that the implications of discipleship have never been thought out. Let adversity or opposition raise its head and early resolves 'wither' away and are simply dried up.

The choked heart of cluttered soil (v.7) It's the 'thorns' that have been allowed to grow in what could have been good soil. So much to do, to see, earn and enjoy! And so

many worries to attend to.... This is the hearer who becomes diverted from spiritual priorities. Result – a slow expiry....

The changed heart of the receptive soil (v. 8) Is this yours – the open heart - ready and willing to receive the word that draws us into the very kingdom of God in Jesus Christ? It's that category only that will produce a crop for eternity. The Kingdom – it's the biggest thing there is!

Pause for Thought

Bishop of Bradford reflects on preaching to 9 million people

The Bishop of Bradford has praised DJ Chris Evans for building his Radio 2 Breakfast Show into Europe's largest radio audience. Recent industry figures give the show, which includes Pause for Thought, an average of 9.5m people tuning in every day.

The Rt Revd Nick Baines, the Bishop of Bradford, is one of the show's regular Pause for Thought contributors. Speaking in a Church of England podcast published today, (www.churchofengland.org/media-centre/engage-with-us-online/podcasts.aspx)
Bishop Nick says, "You've got to be able to fit in with the medium. It's no good having stuff to say if you don't know how to say it or there is a big 'clunk' between the programme, which is great, fast-moving fun and 'the religious bit'".

Elton John, Barry Manilow,

Barbara Windsor, Peter Kaye and Rick Astley are amongst the showbiz names that Bishop Nick's shared a studio with during the three years he's been on the show. He recalls the morning Suggs, the lead singer with Madness, was Chris' guest. Bishop Nick managed to work sixteen Madness song titles into his *Pause for Thought* script.

Samaritans - celebrating 60 years

Samaritans (until 2002 known as The Samaritans) is a registered charity aimed at providing emotional support to anyone in emotional distress, struggling to cope, or at risk of suicide throughout the United Kingdom and Ireland. The name comes from the Biblical parable of the Good Samaritan, though the organisation is secular.

Samaritans was founded in 1953 by Chad Varah, a vicar in the London Diocese. His inspiration came from an experience he had had some years earlier as a young curate in the Diocese of Lincoln. He had taken a funeral for a girl of fourteen who had killed herself because she feared she had contracted an STD. In reality she was menstruating. Varah placed an advertisement in a newspaper encouraging people to volunteer at his church, listening to people contemplating suicide. The movement grew rapidly: within ten years there were 40 branches and there are now 203 branches across the UK and Ireland. deliberately organised without regard to national boundaries on the basis that a service which is not political or religious should not recognise sectarian or political divisions. Samaritans offers support through over 20,600 trained volunteers (2011) and is entirely dependent on

voluntary support. In 2004 Samaritans announced that volunteer numbers had reached a thirty-year low and launched a campaign to recruit more young people (specifically targeted at ages 18–24) to become volunteers. The campaign was fronted by Phil Selway, drummer with the band Radiohead, himself a Samaritans volunteer.

The Coronation: I was There!

At is, as you may have **J** noticed, the sixtieth anniversary of the Queen's coronation this month. If you are under 55 it is probably simply a matter of history. That piece of history. however, will be relived this month in many grainy pictures on our television screens - even, perhaps, some in colour, from the cinema newsreels of the time. For those of us over that age, however, it is probably one of those memories - images, really that you can never quite forget. In truth, it is part of our history.

Millions, like me, sat in a crowded room and gazed at a tiny television screen on which black and white images appeared of the distant scene in and around Westminster Abbey. Up till then, TV had been largely a rich person's toy, but no one was going to miss the event of a lifetime. Aided by the entrepreneurial genius of Radio Rentals and other newly formed competitors, we watched on rented sets, our own or a neighbour's. Television suddenly became available to almost everybody. Indeed, I can't think of anyone in our very ordinary circle of friends in a London suburb who didn't watch the coronation as it. happened.

And that made a difference. Previous coronations had been great affairs of State, attended by the nobility, the great and the good - just a few hundred of them. True,

the crowds could line the route to and from the abbey and cheer and wave flags, but once the real business began they were definitely outside. But now - miraculously, it seemed - we were inside: indeed, we had a better view of proceedings than most of those distinguished folk who had got tickets for the abbey.

This, like no other, was the People's Coronation,



and the young Queen and her fair-haired sailor husband were the People's Monarchy. in a way none of their predecessors could possibly have imagined. When the archbishop placed the crown on her head, we were just feet away (or so it seemed). When he anointed her with oil, we could see it glisten. We could join in the prayers and the hymns, hear the glorious music and fanfares, share with the congregation in the abbey an occasion that was, after all, a vital part of the life of our nation and the Commonwealth.

Time and again over those few days we sang 'Long live our gracious Queen', and she has done it. 'Long to reign over us, happy and glorious'. Exactly.



The School of Social Entrepreneurs

n January this year I was J appointed to head up the School for Social Entrepreneurs in Yorkshire and Humber, a 'school' that aims to support social entrepreneurs from all backgrounds to transfer their talent into real social outcomes, in the form of sustainable solutions to inequalities and poverty in the community. The School for Social Entrepreneurs is not a typical school. There are no exams, no qualifications and

applications are based on attitude not academic results. The programmes are based on action learning, because entrepreneurs learn best by doing and they learn best from their peers and practioners in the field. There is no typical student: the SSE has students aged 19-74 and its students are roughly split 50:50 between men and women. The students have a mix of educational experiences, including those with no formal qualifications

and those who are professionally or academically qualified. Its uniqueness lies in the depth and duration of its support, and in the emphasis on supporting and developing social entrepreneurs alongside their organisation.



A look back in time at previous St Giles Reviews

years ago

The Vicar thanked Mary McMahon & her Spring Fayre Committee for raising £750 for the Church Missionary Society.

Bryan Bundey wrote an interesting article on the laymen's views of "The Peace". He observed that parishioners initially had a natural reticence to greet people in this way in church and yet we usually have no hesitation in greeting and shaking hands with someone outside church? Bryan made a fascinating observation in that "The Peace" was the first time he had ever shaken hands with his wife, Nancy!

He thought that as everybody had got used to this new venture "The Peace" had added a new dimension to the church worship.

Following 2 years of cross stitching and very hard work, 21 kneelers had been finished for the new chapel. These were to be dedicated at Harvest time. Mary Cook was one of these hard workers. However the stitchers were adamant that they would not do another 150 for the main church!!

In May, the Mothers' Union

had attended the Diocesan Festival of Worship at Ripon Cathedral & **Gill Perkin** had carried the banner. Dancers from Harehills School had performed 3 parables.

The Women's Fellowship had enjoyed a talk about Golden Acre Park in the 30s. At that time it boasted of a boating lake, miniature railway, swimming pool and a dance hall.

Joyce Shepheard had raised £155 for the Church of England Childrens Society with a lunch at her house.

Finally the choir had started to use the RSCM Junior Training Scheme and Mark Mumby was thanked for producing the notice boards in the choir vestry. During the winter some boys had left the district and others had become casualties of voice change during adolescence.
