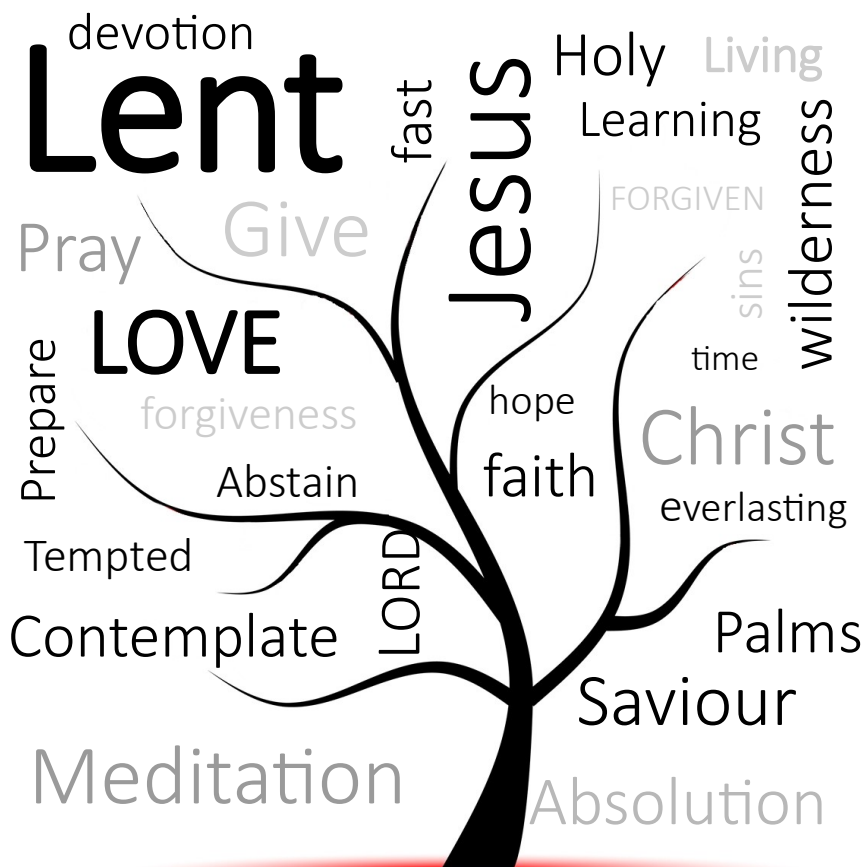

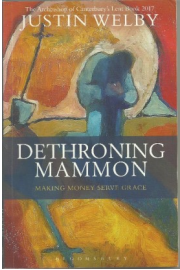

From the library shelf with Sue Grahame



THIS month's book is the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book for 2017, '*Dethroning Mammon: making money serve grace*' by the Archbishop himself, Justin Welby.

Mammon is often thought of as money or wealth; and here it is

explained as the 'power held over individuals and nations by economics, by money and flows of finance.' Jesus refers to Mammon as a 'master' (Matthew 6:24), and consequently in this book Mammon is referred to as 'he', a personalisation of Mammon that implies not just money but the force behind the values imposed on us by the pursuit of wealth. This is what the book is about; the contrast between the values of Jesus and the values we have if we succumb to the force of Mammon.

There are six chapters covering the period prior to Holy Week, the events of Good Friday and Easter and the burial of Jesus. Thus as the author suggests, it might be used in a study group for Lent. In fact this challenging book is not just a book for Lent, but for whenever we need help with the perennial problem of finding a Christian perspective in a world where Mammon is dominant.

In Chapter 1 the author uses the account of the raising of Lazarus to question whether we see the world as God sees it or whether we see it through the eyes of Mammon. What does God offer us, and how does this compare with Mammon?

Chapter 2 explores how we measure things, and what effect this has on our values. Do we always measure things in economic terms? What about all the things which are immeasurable in terms of money, but are of infinite value in the sight of God?

Chapter 3 is about holding on to what we have, and if we share do we do it on our own terms, or in the way that God intends? This takes us on to the fourth chapter, and a consideration of what is 'ours', and what is given to us through God's grace.

Chapter 5, entitled 'What we give we gain', takes as its theme the burial of Jesus and the generosity of Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus, who arranged the burial of Jesus at great cost (not just financial) to themselves. The rest of this chapter concerns how economics works today, particularly in terms of international aid, and the importance of giving, not just to supply material goods, but to build links and relationships. In talking about our own personal giving, the author makes three key points: that 'we need to train ourselves to see the world in terms of abundance and generosity', that we need 'to recognise that there is a political aspect to our actions,' and finally 'that we should see money as an instrument that enables us to build relationships of abundance and grace'.

The final chapter looks at two passages in Revelation, the letter to the Laodiceans, and the Fall of Babylon, with the conclusion that 'The dethroning of Mammon leads to liberty.' How do we dethrone Mammon, both as individuals and as part of society? How do we change our thinking and our actions so that we dethrone Mammon in our own lives? The Archbishop gives answers to these questions, but I'm not going to spoil it for you by telling you what they are!

The book ends with two questions which we might all think about this Lent.

- o Who is on the throne in your life: Mammon or Christ?
- o What might God be calling you to do next?

Our new diocese – how's it going?

A message from Bishop Nick

SO MUCH has been achieved since the Diocese of Leeds was created just two and a half years ago. Bringing together three very different dioceses was a hugely complex procedure, but we are all now part of a large, coherent body, whose benefits are being increasingly revealed.

The bishops and archdeacons are working closely with their areas, and the combined spiritual wealth of 656 churches, over 240 church schools and three cathedrals has brought increased creative energy.

We now have a central office in Leeds (complete with a charitable coffee shop that's open to all), a new parish share system, new governance and further delegation of authority from the diocesan bishop to the area bishops.

Some of the challenges we face include: getting the right balance between one diocese and the five episcopal areas, tackling the anticipated fall in clergy numbers, growing our churches and maintaining parish share. And it remains vital to

reach children and young people with the Gospel in order to build future generations of strong Christians.

At the heart of all we do are the values captured in our diocesan strap line, 'Loving, Living and Learning'. It's a useful list to check against everything we do. What does that mean for you and your church?

OBSERVING children at play during a recent CATS session, I was struck by just how much **learning** was going on in our church hall.

A gaggle of enthusiastic youngsters, gathered around a table with Nick, were fully absorbed in the intricacies of how pieces of a jigsaw interlocked to create a scene from Peppa Pig. **Learning** outcomes included problem solving, estimating, spatial awareness and, of course, teamwork.

At the other end of the hall, Fiona and Gill worked with focussed adults and eager children as they constructed a pair of binoculars. Here, the children **learned** how to listen to instructions and put their understanding into action.

Self managing in our 'kitchen' workshop were three engrossed toddlers preparing an original morning coffee for their parents/carers. After careful consideration, tiny plastic cups were filled with an imaginary liquid and 'flavoured' with raw carrots. Delicious! In this activity, first hand experience was creating genuine **learning** about how to invent and how to be innovative.

Reflecting on these three examples, I felt challenged to ask myself what I, as an adult, could **learn** from the commitment of

these wonderful children. In the first activity the children clearly demonstrated to me how to co-operate as a team working towards a common goal... am I committed to the team ethos or do I work in isolation? In the second example I was in awe at the way the children respectfully engaged with Fiona's instructions... do I always listen so carefully to what others are saying? Finally, the morning coffee presented to appreciative parents reminded me that it is so important to treat those we love every so often. Carrot flavouring may be a step too far but perhaps it is time to put the kettle on and spoil someone special.

CATS meets every Wednesday during term time in the church hall. Toddler Praise is held on the first Wednesday. Everyone is welcome.

When I left school I worked in insurance where I met my first husband Leslie Stones. We moved to Alwoodley in 1960. My only son, Ian arrived a year later. Les had MS and those were difficult years as until the age of eight Ian was a carer with me until Les went into a marvellous special hospital for the chronically sick near Knaresborough where he died eight years later.

I worked full time, firstly managing a music shop (more a trading of jazz and classical) in Leeds and then I became Sales Office Manager for an engineering firm before getting a full-time job as secretary to the Chief Catering Officer at Leeds University.

When I married my second husband Ray Oddy and came to Bramhope, I became full-time step mum to his three children and subsequently worked part-time in the Pathology Department at Leeds University. We lived next to the vicarage for 24 years and I joined Women's Fellowship; singing in the choir for the Christmas Carol Service. My grandchildren are spread from Inverness to New Zealand.

Travel is a love of mine and I had some great holidays, including trekking with a tent in a minibus round Spain and Portugal. I have been to Botswana where my brother was a teacher, South Africa, as well as Thailand. I have been on several cruises and last year went to New Zealand's South Island to see 2 of my grandchildren. Whilst there I did some quad biking and the Abel Tasman Trail which meant kayaking back down the coast.

Since retiring I have been a volunteer at Wheatfield's Hospice for 18 years. I drive the visitor's shuttle bus at Harewood House, and introduced the Brownlee Tri there 3 years ago.

My interest now is with the British Triathlon Team and helping Alistair and Jonny and the Brownlee Foundation. As well as belonging to a health club and singing with the Inspiration Choir. Life is never dull.
