Colin was a loving and caring member of our community who always helped in any



St David

st March is St David's Day, and it's time for the Welsh to wear daffodils or leeks. Shakespeare called this custom 'an honourable tradition begun upon an honourable request' - but nobody knows the reason. Why should anyone have ever 'requested' that the Welsh wear leeks or daffodils to honour their patron saint? It's a mystery!

We do know that David - or Dafydd - of Pembrokeshire was a monk and bishop of the 6th century. In the 12th century he was made patron of Wales, and he has the honour of being the only Welsh saint to be canonised and culted in the Western Church, Tradition has it that he was austere with himself. and generous with others living on water and vegetables (leeks, perhaps?!) and devoting himself to works of mercy. He was much loved.

In art, St David is usually depicted in Episcopal vestments, standing on a mound with a dove at his shoulder, in memory of his share at an important Synod for the Welsh Church, the Synod of Brevi.



Holy Week 2013

Palm Sunday: Jesus at the gates of Jerusalem

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, when the Church remembers how Jesus arrived at the gates of Jerusalem just a few days before the Passover was due to be held. He was the Messiah come to his own people in their capital city, and yet he came in humility, riding on a young donkey, not in triumph, riding on a war-horse.

As Jesus entered the city, the

crowds gave him a rapturous welcome, throwing palm fronds into his path. They knew his reputation as a healer, and welcomed him. But sadly the welcome was short-lived and shallow, for Jerusalem would soon reject the Messiah, and put him to death. On this day churches worldwide will distribute little crosses made from palm fronds in memory of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem.



Maundy Thursday – time to wash feet

Maundy Thursday is famous for two things. The first is one of the final acts that Jesus did before his death: the washing of his own disciples' feet. (see John 13) Jesus washed his disciples' feet for a purpose: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.

In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis' The word 'maundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command). The ceremony of the 'washing of the feet' of members of the congregation came to be an important part of the liturgy (regular worship) of the medieval church, symbolising the humility of the clergy, in obedience to the example of Christ.

But Thursday was also important because it was on that night that Jesus first introduced the Lord's Supper, or what we nowadays call Holy Communion. Jesus and his close friends had met in a secret upper room to share the Passover meal together for the last time. And there Jesus transformed the Passover into the Lord's Supper, saying, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood' as he, the Lamb of God. prepared to die for the sins of the whole world. John's gospel makes it clear that the Last Supper took place the evening BEFORE the regular Passover meal, and that later Jesus died at the same time that the Passover lambs were killed.

Good Friday – the day the Son of God died for you

Good Friday is the day on which Jesus died on the cross. He was crucified in





It is the most solemn day in the Christian year, and is widely marked by the removal of all decorations from churches. In Lutheran churches, the day was marked by the reading of the passion narrative in a gospel, a practice which lies behind the 'passions' composed by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685 - 1750). Both the St Matthew Passion and the St John Passion have their origins in this observance of Good Friday.

The custom of observing a period of three hours' devotion from 12 midday to 3pm on Good Friday goes back to the 18th century. The 'Three Hours of the Cross' often take the form of an extended meditation on the 'Seven Last Words from the Cross', with periods of silence, prayer, or hymnsinging. *Parish Pump*



The Way I See It: BACK FROM THE DEAD?

Christmas packs them in, but Easter, which falls this month, is undeniably the defining Christian festival. It was St Paul, no less, who set out the stark truth: 'If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile'.

Without the resurrection of Jesus which Easter celebrates, the whole Christian story collapses. He would simply take his place with all the other great religious teachers of history who died and are buried somewhere. But the Christian creeds are adamant: 'on the third day, he rose from the dead'. The resurrection is not, for Christians, an optional extra.

In the current western



atmosphere of scepticism, that claim is regarded as selfevidently ridiculous. We all know what 'dead' means. whether it's a dead bird or flower or person. Death is the termination of life - as people say now, 'end of'. Many people are attracted to the teaching of Jesus, but they simply can't accept as credible the claim that he rose from the dead. They assume that the whole idea is the product of gullible minds. His followers wanted to believe that he was alive again, and simply talked themselves into believing

that he was.

However, this scepticism about the resurrection of Jesus is itself the product of preconceived assumptions. The sceptics don't believe that Jesus rose from the dead and assume that it is self-evident that he didn't. In fact, their position is not based on evidence, but on an assumption that it simply couldn't have happened. Yet strangely enough, what evidence we have suggests very strongly that it did.

Make way for Mum

Jt's possible to make a few fairly specific forecasts about Sunday March 10th. The most certain is that all over Britain mothers will receive cards, the best ones being homemade with crayons or felt-tip pens and featuring hearts and smiley faces. There may well be presents, too, carefully if clumsily packaged and containing one or more of the following: chocolate (in



various forms), cosmetics, handkerchiefs or funny aprons.

From a more senior source (if the recipient is lucky) might come some flowers, a book, some half-decent perfume, or a subscription to a fashion magazine. If, however, he's got it wrong (as he usually does) she might find herself with a toaster, a new iron or even a season ticket for the local football club. It's Mothers' Day!

Of course, as far as the

Church is



concerned it's nothing of the kind. It's 'Mothering Sunday', which sounds quite menacing, really - too near 'smother' for comfort. Yet it did all start in church long ago, with a Lesson for the fourth Sunday of Lent which included the phrase 'Jerusalem which is above. the mother of us all' and a tradition of welcoming apprentices home halfway through the Lenten fast, bearing simnel cakes for their mothers

But then the greeting card industry got interested, the occasion spread to America and bingo - it was suddenly big business. Of course it's more than that. It's also a very welcome opportunity to recognise that mothers tend to play a rather big role in everyone's life and to say 'thanks' to them. On the whole, Mothering Sunday/ Mothers' Day is definitely a 'good thing'.

It's also quite a good thing for the church, because families like to come together on this particular day, and by tradition (fairly recent, I suspect) posies of flowers are provided for the children to give to their mums - and sometimes grandmas, too. Because the following weekend is the feast of the Annunciation (the angel Gabriel telling Mary that she was going to have a baby), preachers may justifiably point out how crucial the role of motherhood is in the whole Christian story. All those paintings and stained glass windows of the Madonna and Child remind us that. just like all the rest of us. Jesus had a mother who fed and nurtured him, guided him through the years of childhood and stood by him later on when things were dark and dreadful.

Some chocolate, some flowers, a phone call, a nice lunch out - only a gesture, perhaps, but they are ways of saying 'thank you, mum'.

She deserves it, doesn't she?





Further words of 'wisdom' from our organ repairer....

rurther to my conversation with Malcolm Spink, our pipe organ repairer he passed on some more musical and mathematical facts.

Most of us are aware that sound is carried through the air in waves - sound waves which, for a constant pitch, need to vibrate at a constant frequency. I'm no mathematician and I certainly can't play a musical instrument but I must admit to often wondering about the connection between frequency of vibration and the pitch of a note heard by the human ear. It wasn't until the middle of the 18th century that that there was broad agreement on the exact pitch (frequency) of a particular note and agreement on a standard scale. (Before then, an 'A' in one part of Europe could be quite different to an 'A' in another part of Europe, so it was almost impossible to bring instruments tuned in different countries together to play in an orchestra without having to completely retune them). This scale is known as twelve tone 'Equal Temperament'. But what does this mean in terms of frequency?

Malcolm explained that for example, the vibration

frequency of middle 'A' is 440 cycles per second (cps) and the 'A' an octave above is twice this. i.e. 880 cps, and a further octave above, is 1760cps. Thus the frequency of any note is double that of its lower cousin. On going down the scale, one can halve 440 to 220, and again to 110, then to 55, and 22.5 and so on until it is no longer audible to the human ear. All of these frequencies will produce the note of 'A' as we now know it, each an octave apart from each other. However, when one considers for example, at the upper end mentioned, 880 cps is the difference between one octave and the next one up, but at the lower end, it's only 22.5cps, the logic is less clear. However, that is how the human ear interprets the sound waves and we have to accept it as fact.

So far we have only mentioned sound in octaves; but, I asked Malcolm, "What about the individual notes that make up an octave, what is the relationship between them?"

Malcolm went on to tell me that the frequency of each note is different from the one next to it by a factor of 1.05946309436. Therefore with middle A being 440cps, the next note up, A# (A sharp)

has a frequency of 440 x 1.05946309436 = 466.16376151840cps, and if one multiplies 440 x 1.05946309436 twelve times the result is 880cps – the note of 'A' one octave higher up the scale.

It all sounded so simple, until Malcolm explained that the figure of 1.05946309436 is known in mathematical circles as the 12th root of 2. Now try explaining that to anyone!

Last month's magazine revealed that there are 18 stops o0n the St Giles' organ. Now look up the formula in January's article on page 17 and work out how many different sounds this organ can make, assuming that it is possible for all the stops to be played at any one time. The answer will be in next month's magazine.




