Communion.

This year our Lent course is called 'Another story must begin' using the film 'Les Miserables'. We will use the DVD of the film and consider the grace of God, and our own fallen state and opportunity for redemption, to help us to reassess what we can do with our lives and for those around us. Look out for the sign up list in the lobby soon.

May God bless the work of our new diocese and all the parishes that are within the care of our new Bishop,

St Cuthbert c 634-87 Monk and Bishop of Lindisfarne

uthbert of Lindisfarne Chas long been northern England's favourite saint. It is easy to see why: Cuthbert loved God with all his heart. and loved others as himself. By all accounts, he was holy, humble, peaceable, prayerful, faithful in friendship, charming and really kind.


Cuthbert was born into a fairly well-off Anglo-Saxon family, and became a monk at Melrose in 651. He and another monk. Eata, were sent to start a monastery at Ripon, but Alcfrith, who owned the land, insisted that they adopt the Roman customs, which Cuthbert's Celtic church did not allow. So Cuthbert and Eata quietly returned to Melrose, where Cuthbert became prior in about 661. Then came the Synod of Whitby in 663/4, and the Celtic Church formally decided to adopt the Roman Customs. After this, Cuthbert was sent on to Lindisfarne as prior, where he sensitively introduced the new ways, and won over the monks there.

Cuthbert was very much loved at Lindisfarne. His zeal was evident in his constant preaching, teaching, and visiting of the people. He was also said to have

gifts of prophecy and healing. Occasionally, Cuthbert reached 'people overload'. Then he would retreat to a tiny islet called Inner Farne, where he could pray in total seclusion. When, to his horror, he was told he had been made Bishop of Hexham, he immediately 'swapped' sees with Eata. and stayed on at Lindisfarne as Bishop. Sadly, Cuthbert died on little Inner Farne. only two years later, on 20 March, 687.

Cuthbert was buried at Lindisfarne, but that is not the end of his story. For it was only now that his travels began. After the Vikings destroyed Lindisfarne in 875. final, and safe, resting place. For the next 120 years Cuthbert was deposited in various monasteries around the north of England and southwest Scotland. Finally. in 999. Cuthbert was allowed to rest in Durham, where a Saxon church was built over his shrine. All that travel must have done him good; when his body was exhumed to be put into the new Norman Cathedral in Durham in 1104, it was said to be still 'in perfect tact', and 'incorrupt'.

Lent – a time to think

Lent is a month to think about sinning. When people sin against us, we get hurt. (Have you ever been lied to? Been robbed? It hurts.) When we sin against others, we also get hurt: we feel guilty before God, we lose our self-respect, and we feel isolated.

The little book of 1 John, in the New Testament, talks a lot about sin. John did not write in anger, but out of deep pastoral concern. His desire was that those who name Jesus as their Lord face the reality of sin in their lives. He wanted them to learn to avoid it as a pattern that ruled their lives.

John reminded his readers that God is perfect light, holy, and the source of all life, truth and beauty. Christ, his son, the Light of the World, came to redeem us from our separation from him caused by sin, which has marred the world since the



fall of Adam and Eve.

So what is sin? The Bible says that sin includes not only physical indulgences of our selfish appetites, but also our lustful, angry and hateful thoughts, as well as our self-righteousness, selfish ambition, divisive spirit, and pride.

All of the Law of God, Jesus said, is summarized in the Great Commandment to love God with our entire being and our neighbour as ourselves (Mark 12:28-34), and not one of us in light of these commands can claim to be without sin (Luke 10:25-37).

As John makes clear in his short epistle, even God's being-saved, true believers will be guilty, perhaps even daily, of single acts of sin. Even though true believers have been released from the dominance of the habitual patterns of sinful behaviour, and have access to the liberating, victorious power of the Spirit for new life in Christ, we still, as long as we remain in these sin-prone bodies, will commit sin.

Yet this is not to discourage us, but to encourage us to



take action. Our Father in heaven is a loving Father. waiting for us to come back to him, confessing each sinful failure, each hour of each day, if necessary. There's no sin so great as to separate you from the Father's mercy, grace, forgiveness and love. And through the Holy Spirit, we can become more Christ-like in our nature. It is a growth process, and we need to start growing now. This month is the perfect time for you to return to the Father's house. and receive and celebrate his complete forgiveness.

St Giles Healing Ministry

Anice's letter in the J January Magazine described in some detail the Church's Healing Ministry, and our own involvement at St. Giles, where we have the opportunity to share in private prayer within our services, in confidence. At present this takes place at 9.30am on the 3rd Sunday of the month, and at 6.30pm on the 2nd Sunday. We plan to leave the evening service as it is on the 2nd Sunday, but in future to vary Healing Prayer during the morning services at 9.30am. It will remain in

February on the 3rd Sunday, but then from March take place on 1st Sunday, in April on 2nd Sunday, in May on the 3rd Sunday etc. so that we try to cover the varying congregations throughout the month, in turn. The details of these dates will continue to be shown on the back page of the magazine, and also on the lobby notice board so that you will know which services are involved. As Janice said -"You can ask for prayer for yourself, or for someone else. We will pray with you that you (they) may

experience God's healing and that you may have a sense of his presence with you, his love, his peace and his support through the Holy Spirit. Whoever you are, whether you attend church or not and whatever your needs, you are welcome to come and ask for prayer".

Use it and lose it!

() bumped into one of my excolleagues and in our conversation he explained that life was difficult for him. I asked if he still went to church... he didn't. I asked if he tried praying to God. He said he didn't know how to pray any more. I replied, "I have the very booklet for you, called Trypraying." A few weeks later he said he had found the booklet very helpful and that he had recommitted his life to Christ and that his life was getting back on track.

This is just one of many stories coming out of the *Trypraying project* which has been running in Edinburgh for several years. This year HOPE is working in partnership with *Trypraying* to encourage Christians to use the *Trypraying* booklet themselves for a week – then to lose it; to give away the booklet to a neighbour, friend, relative or colleague with a simple suggestion: try praying.

One in three people believes that God answers prayers - and *Trypraying* relies on God to respond to those who reach out to him in prayer.

The *Trypraying* booklet is a seven-day prayer guide written in accessible language for people who

don't do church. There's a simple challenge to try praying for seven days and see what happens. It has short articles and stories of answers to prayer. There are things to do each day as well as a short prayer to pray.

Islamic extremism and us

In a sermon a few months ago I referred to *The Islamist* by Ed Husain. Its subtitle was 'Why I joined radical Islam in Britain, what I saw inside and why I left' which is a fair enough synopsis of what the book is about. As several people have mentioned the book since then I thought it worthwhile to share some of the insights it gives to Muslim extremism and the present situation in the Middle East.

At the beginning of the book, (Mohamm) Ed Husain was a well-brought-up teenager in South London. His parents were devout Muslims, his grandfather in particular a highly spiritual person who practised his faith as the path to inner peace and social wellbeing. These are universal values within all the great religions. But teenagers rebel and young Mohammed found himself drawn to a more assertive form of Islam. To begin with he joined the Young Muslim Organisation, but as he progressed through Further and Higher Education he became more and more radicalised, eventually joining the Islamist movement Hizb ut -Tahir

Islamism has its roots in a wish to return to a more fundamental and literalist view of the Quran and asserting the primacy of Islam in all aspects of life. One example is 'Wahabism' which emerged in Saudi Arabia. It is very 'Puritanical' insisting on the implementation of Sharia law – and Al Ouaeda is its off-shoot. Another example would be the Muslim Brotherhood in Egypt and of course, the Taliban. The various extremist preachers we have seen in the news over recent years also come from the same stable.

Hizb ut-Tahir is banned in many parts of the Islamic world because its goal is the overthrowing of all secular (and democratic) governments in favour of a universal, world-wide government based on the practice of Islam, enforced by sharia law and with a 'Caliph' at its head. The argument is that secular governments have displaced the primacy of Allah and are therefore heretical. This is why, although the 'Islamic Republic of Iran' has a President and an elected assembly, its Supreme Ruler is a cleric. Ironically this is exactly parallel to the early books of the Old Testament. The Israelites were governed by 'judges' until they demanded a King [Saul] like other nations!

.....and the centre for the Caliphate would be in 'the land of Sham' – Syria, which perhaps explains why the conflict there has attracted 'jihadists' from many parts of the Muslim world.

After spending some time in Saudi Arabia, Husain came to realise that radical Islamism was really all about power, rather than an attachment to the Prophet's message. He returned to England and his grandfather's more peaceful and personal faith, a faith more typical of our Muslim neighbours.

But here's the lesson 'In mosques, after prayers, many of my Muslim friends rightly ask what we are supposed to integrate into - 'Big Brother' lifestyle? Ladette culture? Binge Drinking? Gambling?...The neglect of the elderly.....' (pg. 284)...... They have a point!





Mothering Sunday - 4th Sunday in Lent

There is an old Jewish saying: God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers.

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live -in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday



has changed and in many ways now resembles the American Mothers' Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.



















Where is God?

amine. Storms. War. Terrorism. Financial crisis. Divorce. Unemployment. Homelessness. We live in a world of turmoil. One of the best-selling books in recent years, written by a psychiatrist, put it very well with his opening statement: "Life is difficult."

All manner of tragic, harmful things haunt our time. It can be easy to wonder at times: "Where is God in all this?" And perhaps, even more urgently: "Where is God concerning the adversities in my private life?"

The Bible never ignores the problem of evil. Throughout the Old and New Testament wars, disease, famine, and

social breakdown run their course. The Bible explains that the problem lies in the fact that sin and evil are very real indeed. This world really is under the dominion of evil. So bad things WILL happen. But the Bible also

says that another law is in operation: that God still loves this world, and will respond to any one of us who turn to him for help. He does not promise to take us OUT of the problems of this world, but to protect us IN the problems of daily life.

Jesus said that his kingdom is in another world, a world



that is open to anyone who turns to him, who believes that he is who he said he was: the Son of God, who came to earth to die for their sins. Jesus promised us that if we turn to him, he will never turn us away. Instead, we can know that the evil we have done, and which haunts us, has been forgiven. We can have his spirit within us, and know that he will guard us for the rest of our lives through every mishap, and one day we shall inherit eternal life, in his presence.

Surely goodness and mercy will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever." (Ps 23: 4.6)
